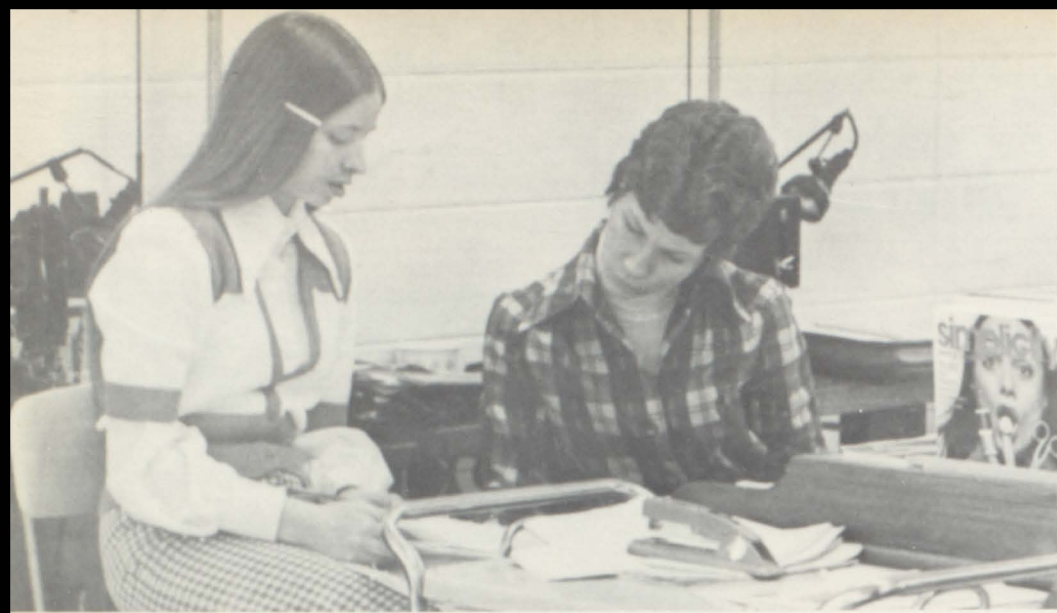

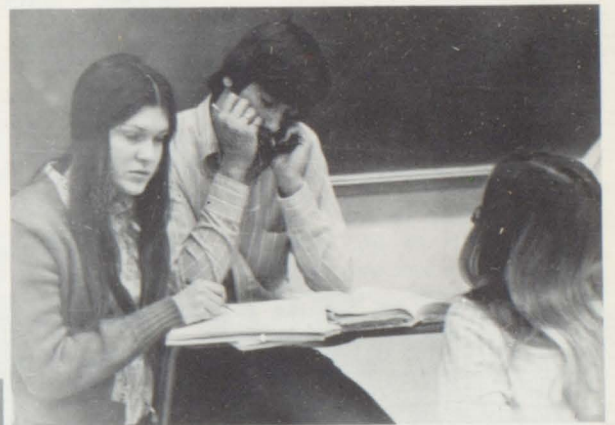

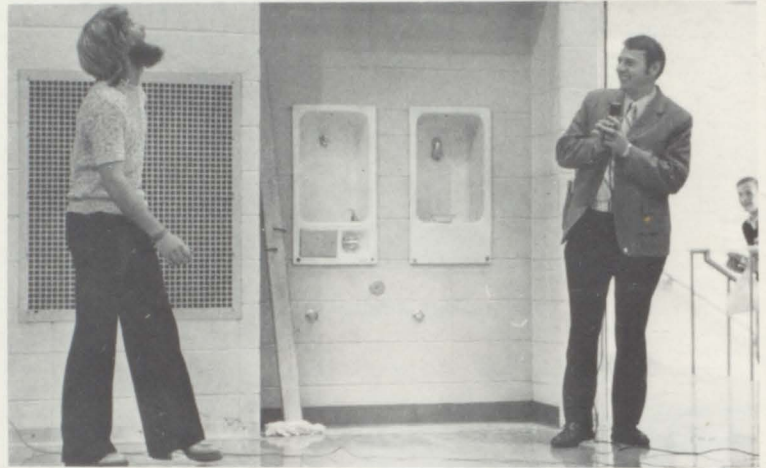

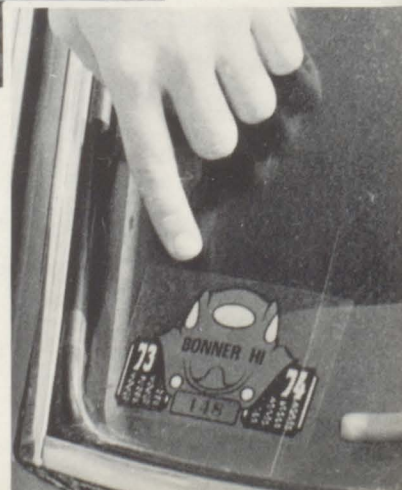

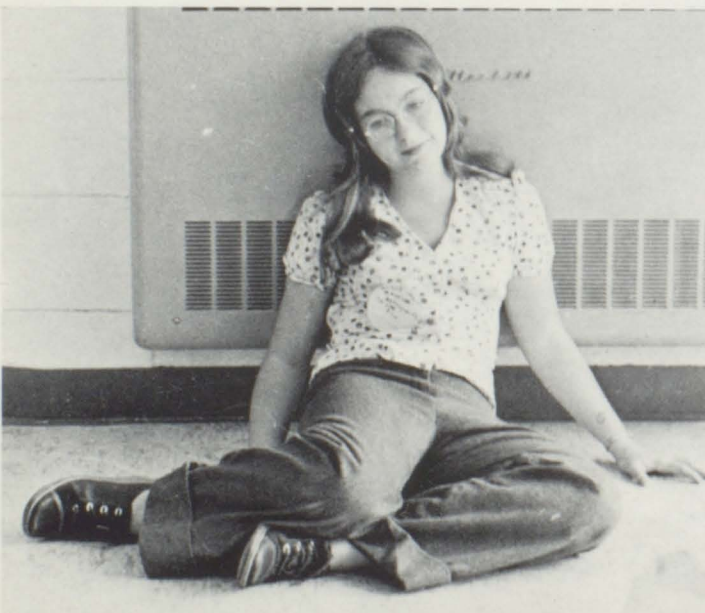

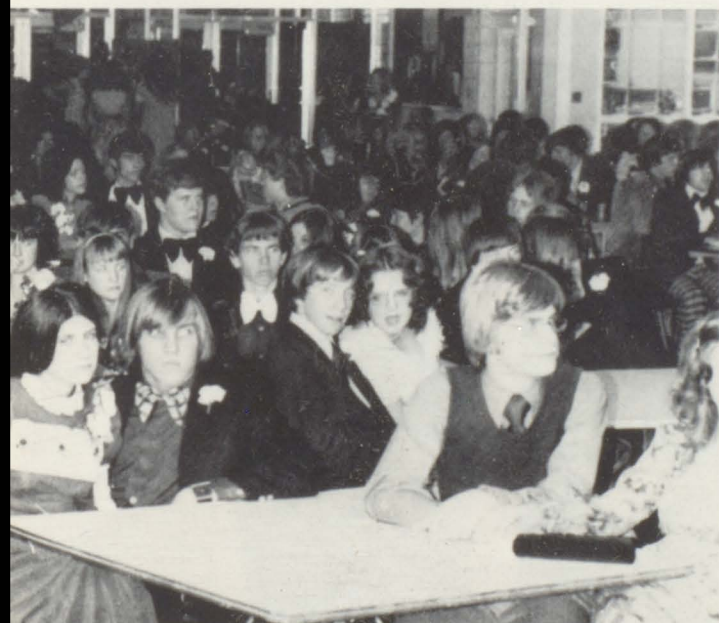

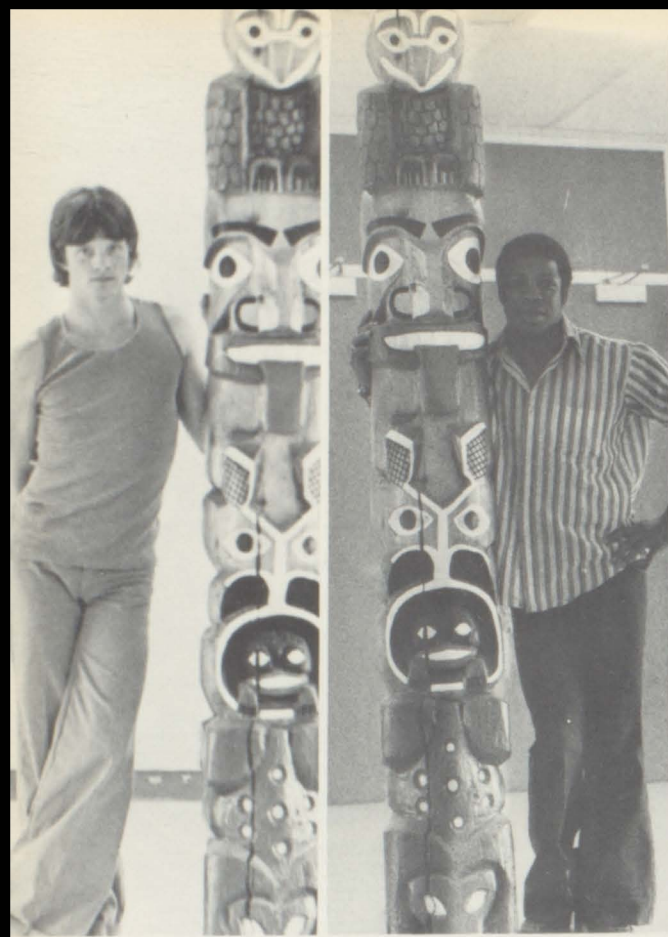

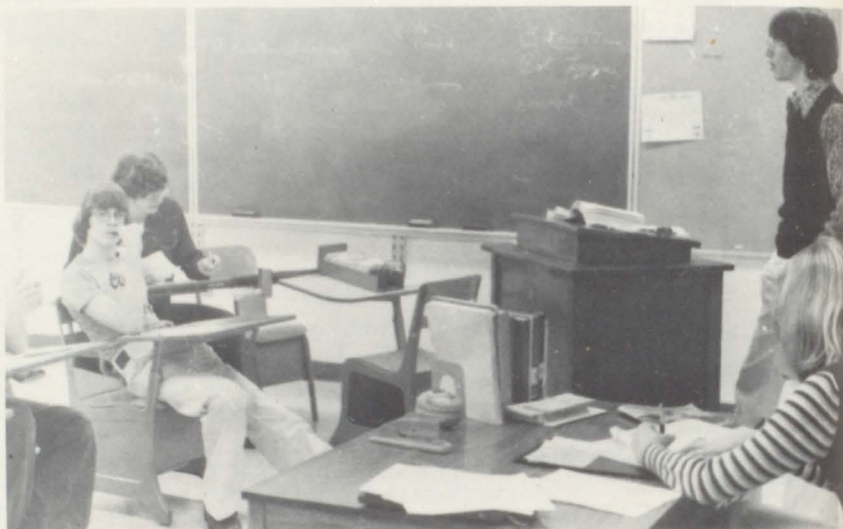

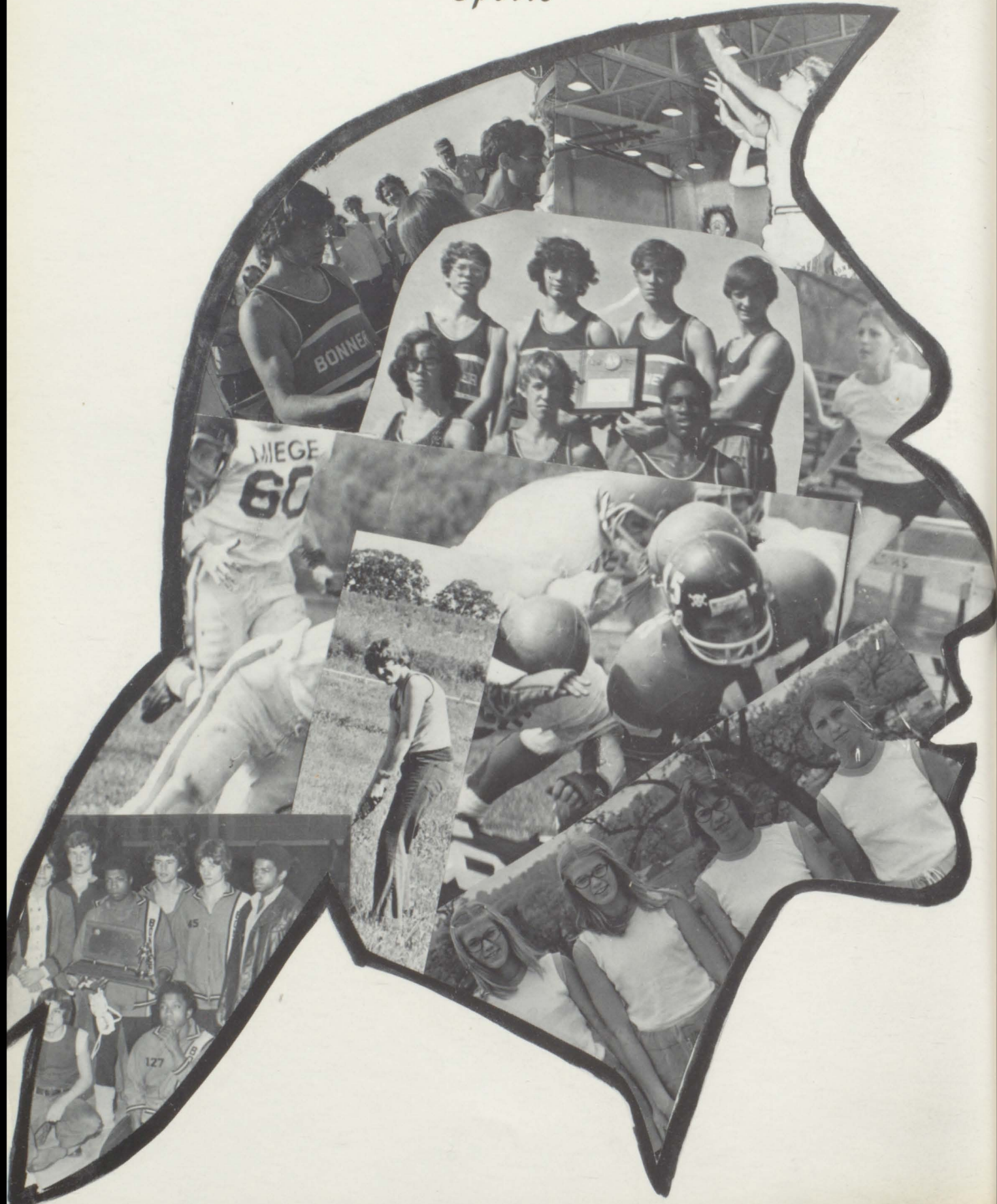

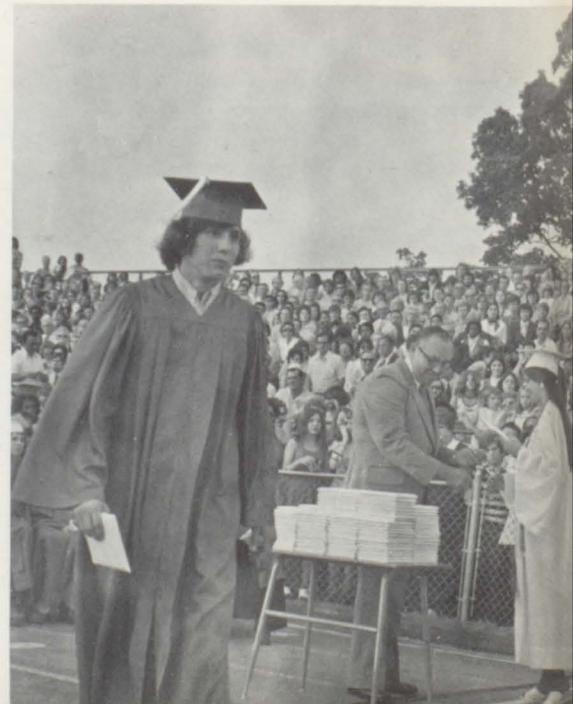




The Ending...
