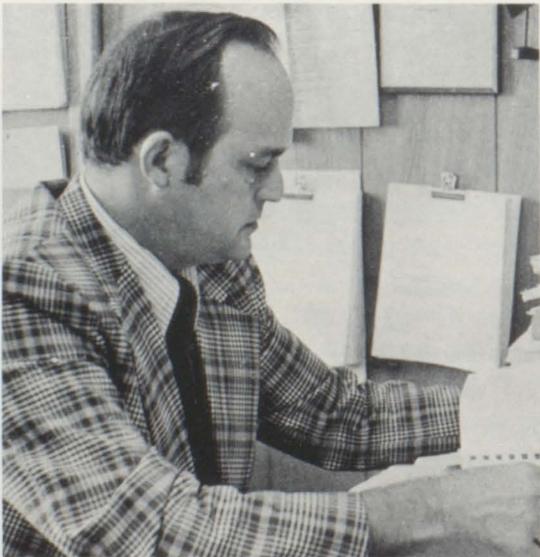


The school board makes decisions about major issues involving the school district.

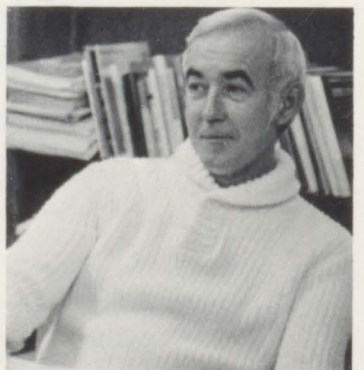

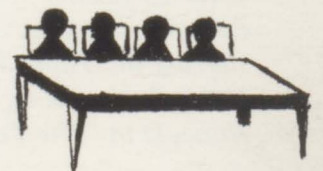

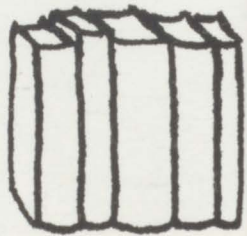
A new addition to the faculty is Ms. Marsha Cowan, Special Education Instruction. Located in the old library conference room, she is a welcome addition to our teaching staff.

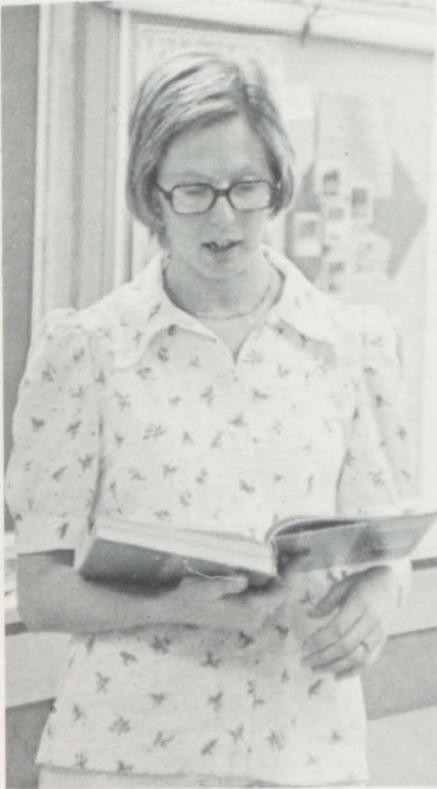

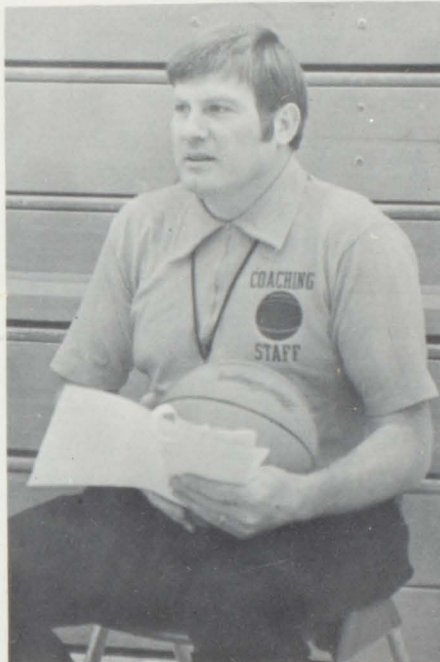

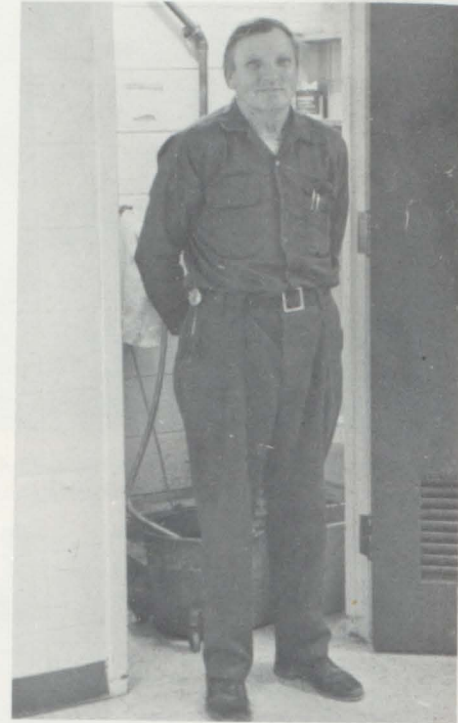

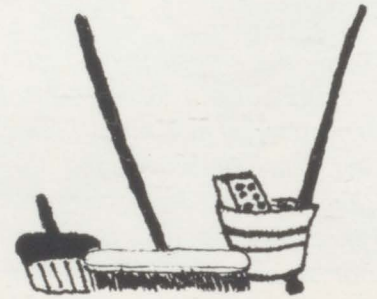

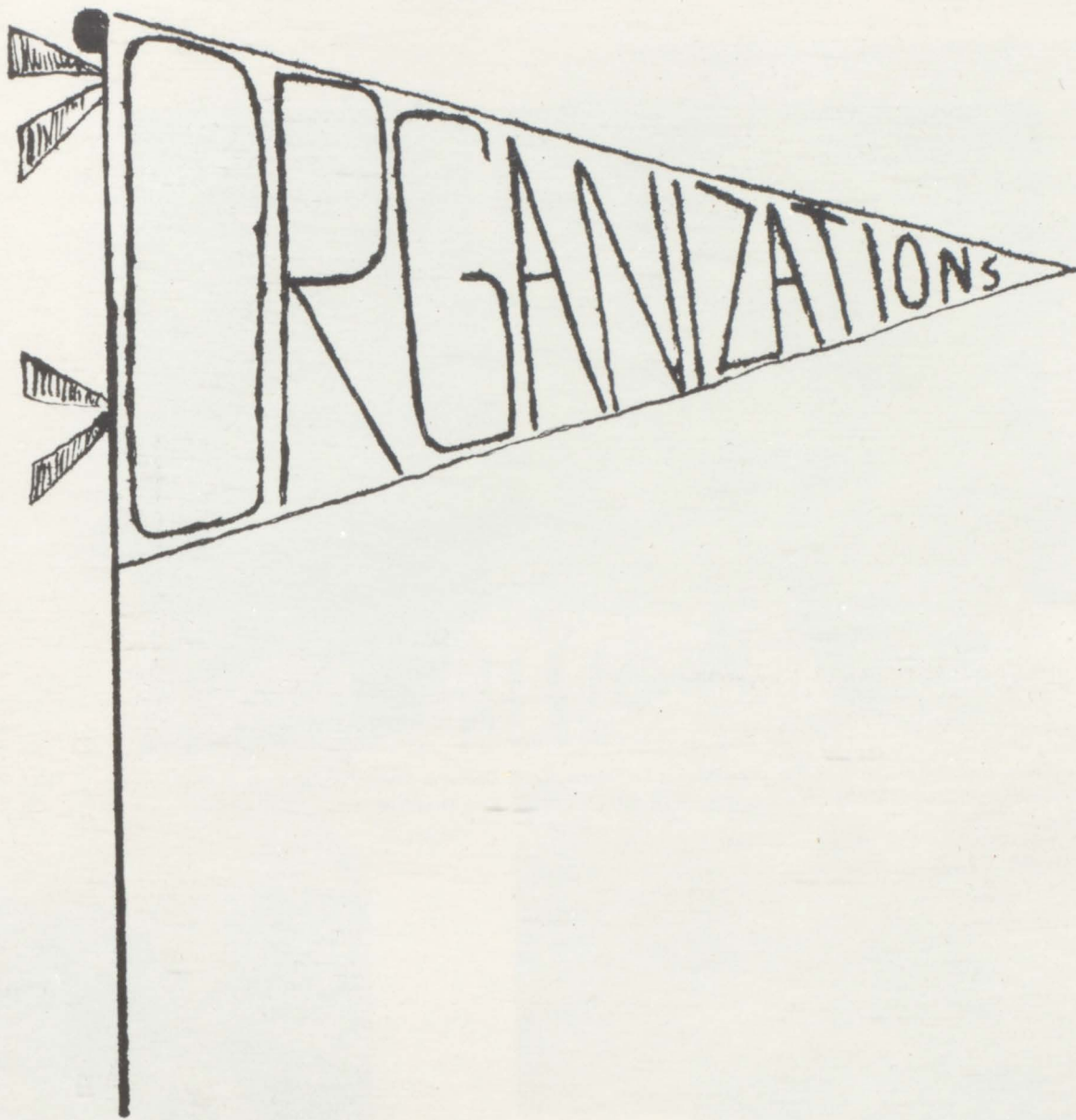
Helping to make life easier for teachers and students are the student helpers. They take roll, participate in discussions, grade papers, and assist groups and individuals.

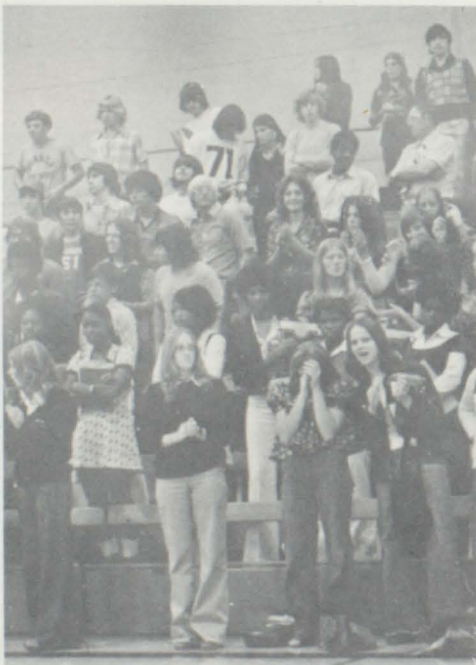



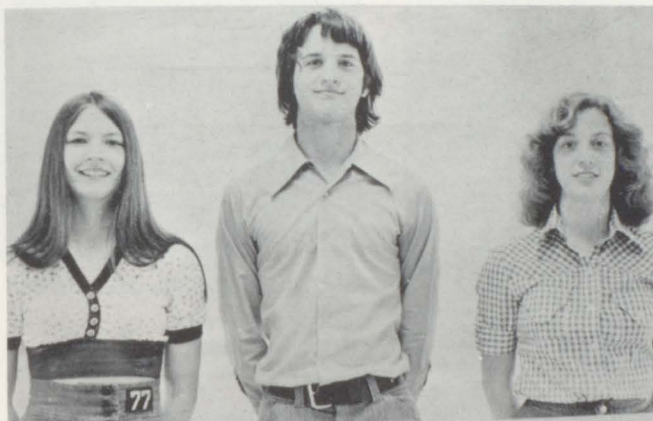

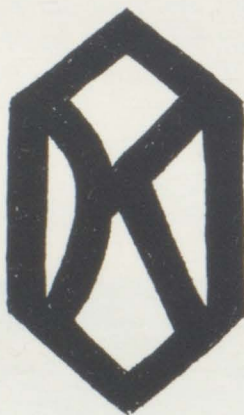

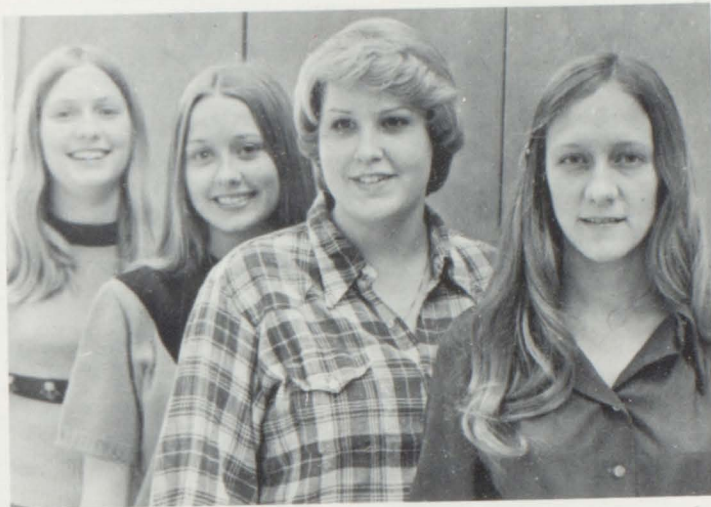

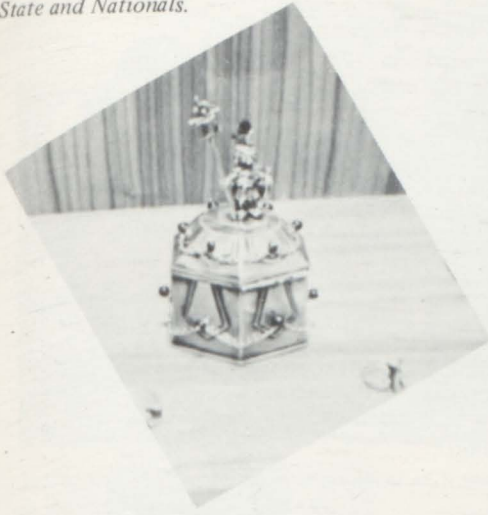

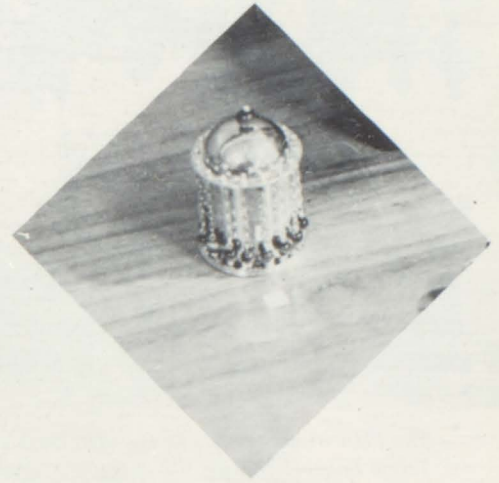

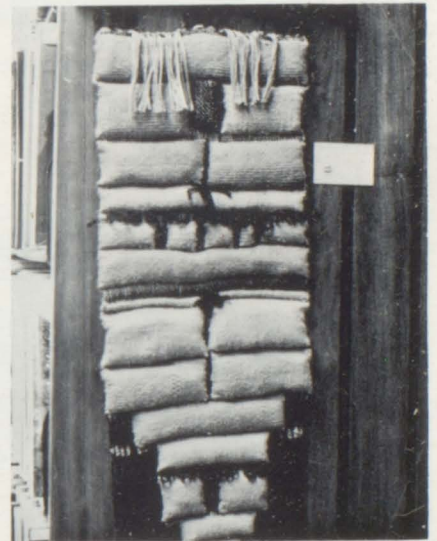

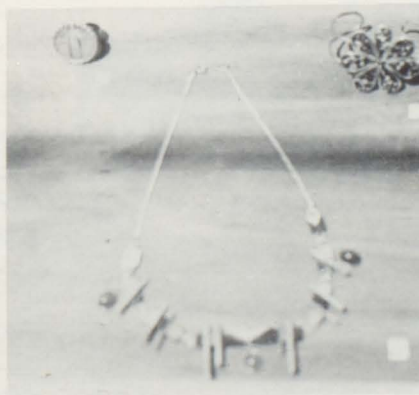

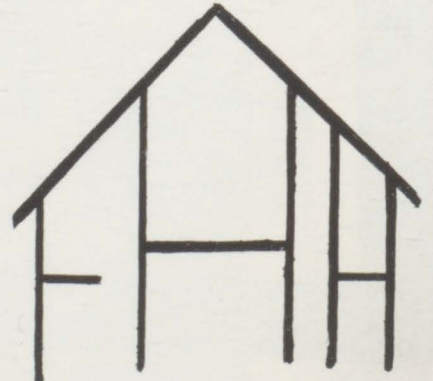

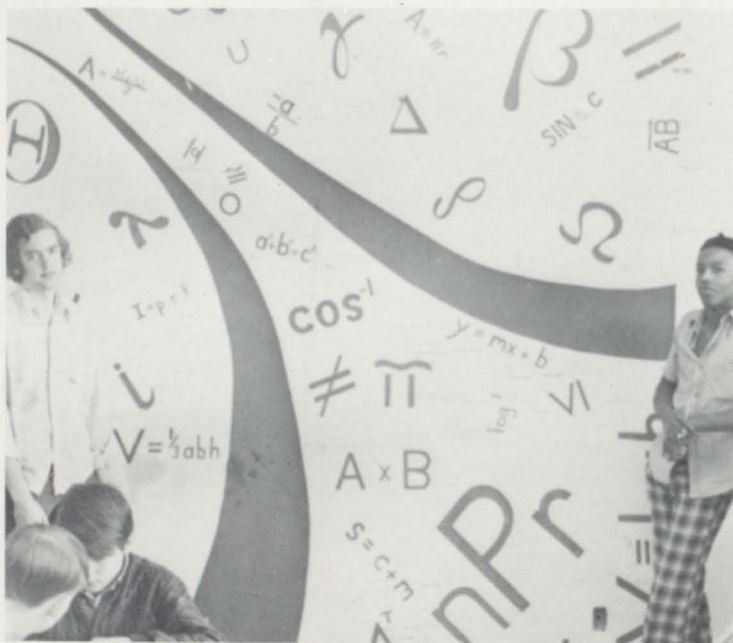

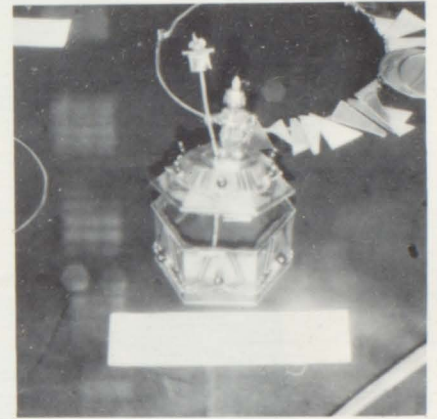

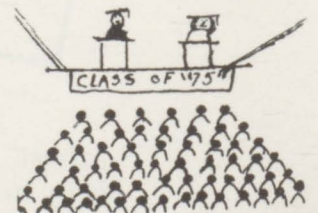

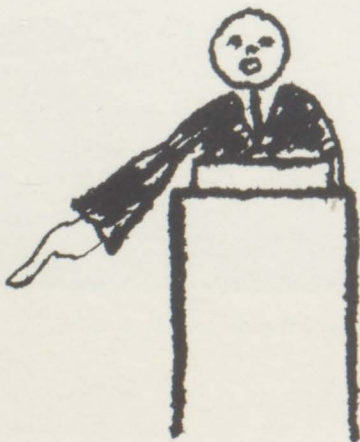

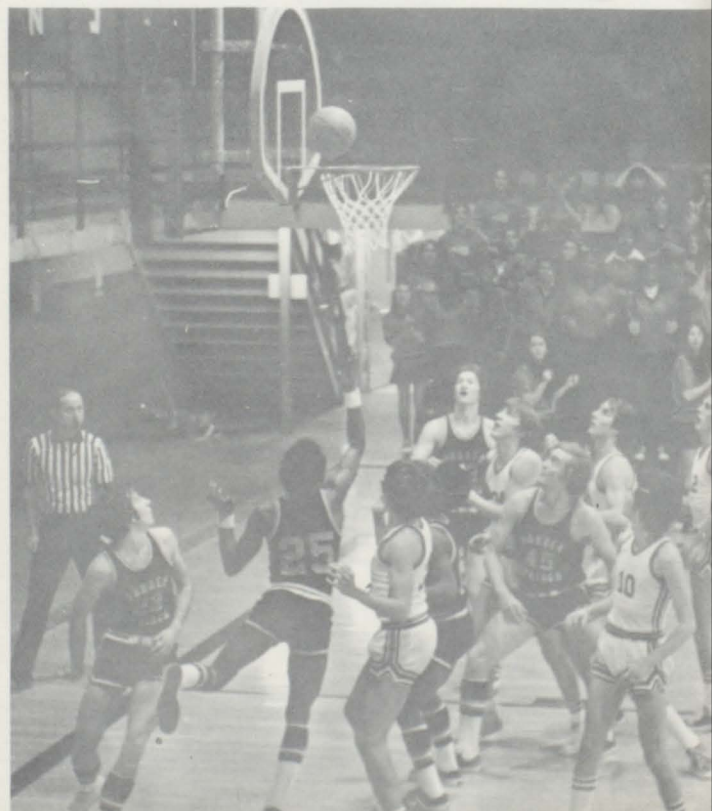

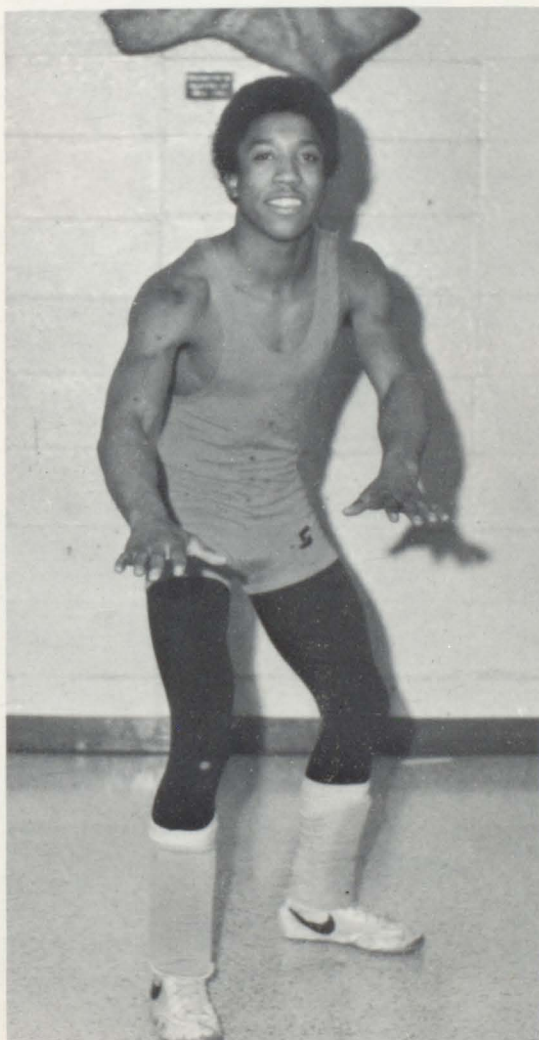
Levi-Grand State Champion

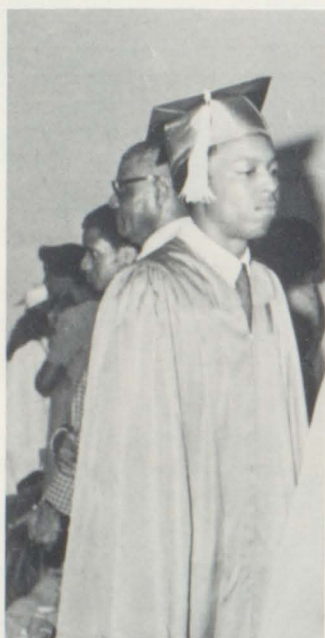
